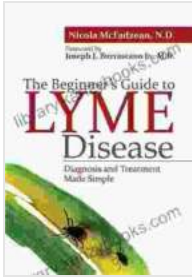

stage, Lyme disease can be treated with a short course of antibiotics. In the later stages, longer courses of antibiotics may be necessary.

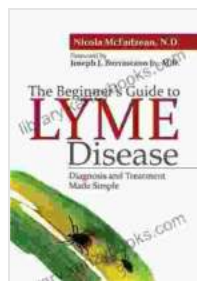
Prevention of Lyme Disease

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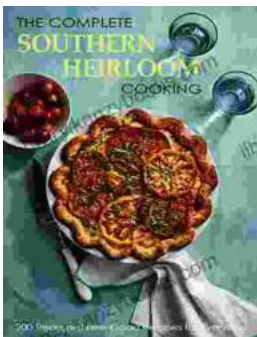
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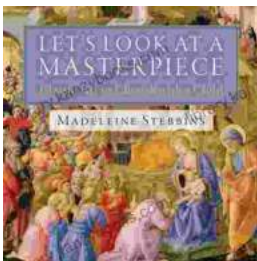
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
